Steinway Piano Competition

After a tentative start I settled and played with freedom, and found the whole event enjoyable, from the compliments received



afterwards I believe the audience were too.

A huge thank you to my piano teacher Mr. Tong for the excellent advice along the way and to Mr. Ferrier for his support during the performance, and to Mr. Roland for hosting the competition and making the recital such a success.

All in all, it was an incredible and unforgettable experience, and with the momentum, I managed to perform even better at the ARSM Piano Performance Diploma exam a week later and was rewarded with a Distinction – what a month!

The concert started lively, with its first act starting with spirited performances of 'Letterbomb' by Green Day (played by the Cementheads, consisting of Saarthak Srivastava, Avi Bhatt and Eddie Haycock), followed immediately by Dvorak's American Quartet performed by Leo Ma, Jian Graffe, alongside James Nunn and Colin Yeung from 4th and 3rd year respectively. The first act continued with wonderful performances with pieces and songs by Brahms, Alter Bridge, and Pasek and Paul, concluding with the Barbershop Quartet of Nathaniel Carson, Oli Lenox-Smith, Arjan Walia and Ryan Chen, who gave the audience a catchy performance of 'Dream a Little Dream' by The Mamas & the Papas, followed by 'You Got a Friend in Me'.

The second act started with some blasts of songs, with Flux starting with 'Prayer' by Kendrick Lamar. Highlights of the second

act include Eddie Haycock pouring his soul into the microphone while singing 'Blind' by Korn, Ralph Yao's beautiful rendition of 'Fantaisie-Impromptu' by Chopin, Gabriel Lau and Leo Ma joining forces to play Hadelich's very difficult violin-cello duet arrangement of Brahms' 'Hungarian Dance No. 5', Daniel Frith giving the premiere of his own composition of 'Yeux Embués', and Jian Graffe's soulful depiction of the 3rd movement of Rachmaninoff's 'Sonata for Cello and Piano'.

All these performances were exceptionally well made, and the range of talents made this concert one of the best ever at Hampton.

Summer Concert

The music department's year was rounded off by a brilliant Summer Concert, in which all of Hampton's ensembles performed. After the audience was welcomed by the Jazz Band in the Cloisters, they settled in for the first performance of the night: Bach's Concerto in C Minor performed by Oli Hudson and Nathaniel Carson. The Consort of Voices then gave a moving rendition of Billy Joel's 'And So It Goes', before the Percussion Ensemble performed 'Clapping Music', using only their hands. Brilliant soloing in Swing Band followed, and fittingly for the third day of the Wimbledon tennis competition, Sinfonia performed the popular BBC theme tune 'Light and Tunesful'. Some of Hampton's junior ensembles then took to the stage, with performances by ROAR!, Hampton Strings and Junior Jazz. The first half was rounded out by Voices of Lions singing the famous theatrical ballad 'Send In The Clowns' from 'A Little Night Music', and Brass Band (complete with an electric guitar) playing 'Gonna Fly Now'. All ensembles performed brilliantly, and it was a first half to be proud of.

The second half's main event was three solo performances accompanied by the Symphony Orchestra (who were led superbly by Leo Ma). Oscar Qian was first up playing the second movement of Saint-Saens' Piano Concerto, a lively piece which demanded incredible precision from the soloist. Oli Lenox-Smith followed by playing Koussevitsky's double bass concerto. This was similarly excellently performed – a very moving performance. The final soloist was Nathaniel Carson, singing two songs from Ralph Vaughan Williams' 'Five Mystical Songs' ('Easter' and 'Love Bade Me Welcome'). This was supported by the Chamber Choir, with soloist, orchestra and choir coming together to create a marvellous spectacle. The concert was officially closed with 'Les Toreadors' from Bizet's 'Carmen' suite, fun for both players and audience alike. As it was the last concert of the year, this was to be the Upper Sixth's last ever end of term concert up on the Hammond stage, and to mark the occasion they paid tribute to Mr Roland by singing David Bowie's Starman Star-Dan. This topped off what was an impressive night showcasing Hampton's incredible talent, as well as the leavers' gratitude to a department that has forged friendships, given amazing opportunities and created memories to last a lifetime.

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STAFF INTERVIEW

with Sarah Mattinson

Head of Academic Music



Tell us a little bit about your time at Hampton?

I've been lucky enough to have been teaching at Hampton for five years now. It has been something of a whirlwind, but I have loved (almost) every minute of it! I started off as a Teacher of Music, doing my PGCE early in my time here, and have since taken on the role of Head of Academic Music, which I have so enjoyed doing for the last two and a half years. It's a remarkable department to be a part of, with truly outstanding colleagues and a phenomenal and ever-changing set of pupils to work with.

What are your academic responsibilities within the Music department?

My main role is to oversee the academic side of things here in Music. It has been such a pleasure helping to shape our curriculum design and supporting my colleagues in delivering their teaching across all year groups. It is great that pupils not only have access to an incredible co-curricular Music programme here at Hampton, but that they are also able to engage with the subject to such a high level academically. From First Year to Upper Sixth, Hamptonian pupils have been so impressive in engaging the subject in the classroom, and it has been lovely to see so many recent pupils going off to study Music at university.

What have you most enjoyed teaching whilst here at Hampton?

I love the variety that teaching all the way from First Year to Upper Sixth affords. One period I'll be teaching Reggae to First Year and the next I'll be unpacking Tchaikovsky's Sixth Symphony with my A Level class. But the one topic that I've enjoyed teaching the most is the Jazz area of study in the A Level course. The pupils explore Jazz from 1920-1960 and so we are able to dive into the music of so many iconic Jazz artists, from Louis Armstrong to Dizzy Gillespie, Sidney Bechet to John Coltrane, Billie Holiday to Sarah Vaughan. My Spotify is now always dominated by Jazz, particularly the Cool Jazz of the late 1950s, and I have loved having the excuse to delve into the music of so many hugely influential artists from this era.

What are your responsibilities outside of the classroom?

Alongside my passion for academic Music, I have been so thrilled to direct a number of ensembles during my time at Hampton. At the moment, I run ROAR!, Chamber Choir and Consort of Voices, all of whom have been such a pleasure to work with. With such capable and enthusiastic pupils involved, we are able to be so ambitious with our repertoire choices. Whether singing songs from the shows with ROAR! or complex sacred repertoire with Consort, I have just loved preparing Hampton's choirs for concerts and services alike. And outside of music, one of the highlights of my week is always running Hampton's Cryptic Crossword Club with Mr Haynes – Hampton's cruciverbalists are a very impressive bunch!

Which one piece of music would you choose for your Desert Island?

My answer for this changes on an almost daily basis. Today I'm leaning towards Herbie Hancock's version of the slow movement from Ravel's Piano Concerto in G. But I could just as easily choose the aria from Bach's Goldberg Variations, ideally played by Glenn Gould (in 1981, 1955). Or Bill Evans' Peace Peace. Or Chet Baker's I Fall in Love Too Easily. Or Olivia Dean's Dive. There are too many options!

And your Desert Island luxury?

In my last HSMS interview I said that I would take a piano. A good choice, I think. But I would struggle without reading material – so perhaps a fully stocked e-reader or, even better, an enormous library.

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
